





The Patrol Division has always been the heart and soul of the agency. Some of the duties of our Public Safety Officers assigned to the Patrol Division include:

- Provide immediate response to emergency situations
- Conduct preliminary investigations of crimes
- Enforcement of state and local laws
- Traffic enforcement
- Alcohol enforcement
- Accident investigation

Some additional facts about public safety:

- All officers are cross trained as Police Officers and Firefighters
- 27 Public Safety Officers are also Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT)
- 1 Public Safety Officer is also a Paramedic

All Officers complete a minimum of 8 hours of police, fire and medical training each month.

Evidence Technician Unit

Eleven specially trained officers are responsible for recovering and processing crime scene evidence. Some of the duties include:

- Identifying, collecting and preserving trace evidence
- Identifying, developing, and lifting latent fingerprints
- Documenting crime scenes through photography, video, diagrams and drawings
- Digital photography of major accident scenes

Firearms Training

With 2 Sergeants and 5 PSO's trained as Firearms Instructors, all sworn personnel train semi annually at the Macomb County gun range.




PSO Jacques Simon and Sgt. Jason Poole of the Fraser Public Safety Dept have completed specialized training that will enhance the department's ability to detect and arrest drivers under the influence of drugs.

DREs are trained to recognize signs of impairment in drivers under the influence of drugs other than, or in addition to, alcohol and to identify the category or categories of drugs causing the impairment. DREs conduct a 12-step evaluation process to make this determination.

PSO Simon and Sgt. Poole took part in two weeks of instruction at the Michigan State Police Training Academy in Lansing and spent a third week conducting drug assessments at the Maricopa County Jail in Arizona. This facility processes an average of 900 inmates per day which provided officers the opportunity to conduct hands-on drug evaluations for all seven drug categories, a requirement of the course.

The DRE program, also referred to as the Drug Evaluation Classification Program, began in the 1970s with the Los Angeles Police Department. The program operates under the guidelines and direction of the International Association of Chiefs of Police and is supported by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). There are more than 7,300 DREs across the nation. Nationally, 18% of all drivers killed in crashes in 2009 tested positive for drugs, according to NHTSA. In Michigan, 20% of drivers killed tested positive for drugs.



According to recent statistics, alcohol use has declined dramatically while drug use has risen. Only 1.5% of weekend nighttime drivers had BACs at or above .08. However, 22.5% tested positive for drugs, an increase from 16.3% in 2007. 12.6% tested positive for marijuana, compared to 8.6% in 2007. PSO Simon recently received his certification as a DRE instructor and will assist the Michigan Office of Highway Safety and Planning in teaching the DRE curriculum to officers across the state and helping them obtain their DRE certification.

Cyber Crime Investigation & Digital Forensics Unit

To date, the Cybercrime and Digital Forensic Unit has been involved in multiple investigations of cybercrime, specifically cyberstalking, fraud, and various other computer related offenses. Computer Forensic examinations have also been carried out to assist in narcotic, gambling, and death investigations.

The unit has worked to assist area departments with computer forensic examinations. The unit has also expanded its forensic capabilities now having the ability to perform forensic examinations on cellular phones and similar personal data accessories. PSO Eric Myers has also obtained certification as an AccessData Certified Examiner (A.C.E.)



The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) consists of one lieutenant, one sergeant, two detectives, one prisoner / property officer and one secretary.

Detectives in CID further investigate reports from the forwarded from the road patrol division. They conduct follow up investigations including interviews of victims, witnesses and suspects. Once their investigations are complete, warrant requests are completed and forwarded to the prosecutor's office or city attorney. Detectives are then in charge of cases to their conclusion in the court system

One of the detectives investigates crimes involving juvenile suspects. This detective also works as a liaison with Fraser Public Schools to handle all criminal complaints in the schools.

Liquor license background investigations are completed in this division when businesses are requesting licensing through the Michigan Liquor Control Commission. Annual sting operations are conducted at all businesses in the city with liquor licenses to assure compliance to all laws.

CID completes all backgrounds on applicants for pawn shops, second hand, and precious metal businesses. Detectives also handle all enforcement of these stores. The department continues to use "Leads on Line" which is a computerized system to track all business transactions for pawn shops, second hand stores and precious metal businesses.

Home Invasion

In February 2015, a single mother of two young children had her apartment broken into while she was at work. All of the victim's valuables were taken. At the time of the crime the victim had no idea who the suspects were. The victim was able to give Detectives descriptions of items taken, which included custom jewelry and a serial number on a Cannon camera. Detectives were able to check recent pawn shop activity and found that a male had pawned the camera in Clinton twp and pawned the jewelry in Roseville. Investigation found the suspects girlfriend, set the home invasion up. The victim was a family friend of the female suspect. With intimate knowledge of the victim, they coordinated the break in while the victim was at work and the kids at school.


Detectives were able to get warrants for both suspects. The female fled to Wisconsin and the male evaded arrest. The female suspect was located and brought back to Michigan where she plead guilty to Home Invasion. The male suspect was arrested in early 2016 and is currently being held in Macomb County Jail awaiting trial. The male was suspected in several home invasions in neighboring communities.

Armed Robbery

A Fraser man was contacted through Facebook to meet an old female friend, near The Macomb Mall. The victim picked up the female suspect in his car. After driving around for a while, she asked the victim if he would like to go to local motel on Groesbeck.

Shortly after arriving, two males, armed with knives, knocked on the door and forced their way into the motel room. The victim was assaulted and robbed. The two males and the female all fled together. Through the victims Facebook account Detectives were able to ID the female suspect. Then through her Facebook account Detectives were able to ID the two males involved in the robbery. They were brothers that lived together in Roseville, and had met the female suspect while they all attended a drug rehab class.

All three suspects were arrested and charged with armed robbery. They are all being held at the Macomb County jail, awaiting trial. The brothers had already served lengthy prison sentences for a previous armed robbery.



The Fraser Department of Public Safety Fire Division is responsible for providing fire protection and advanced life support services to the City of Fraser.

One sergeant is assigned to the fire division to complete fire inspections of all businesses in the city. He also conducts fire training for all fire personnel twice a month. Three department personnel have been trained to investigate cause and origin at serious fires. Four Firefighter / Paramedics are assigned to three platoons to provide advanced life support and fire response.


Personnel assigned to the division are also responsible for ordering fire and medical supplies, conducting daily vehicle checks and managing all equipment on the trucks and in the fire garage.

The city has five 302 sites in the city which the state deems as high hazard businesses. Special safety measures are in place at the businesses and the Public Safety Department has special written procedures on how to respond to emergencies at these businesses. All members get extra annual training at these businesses.



The department operates 4 fire emergency vehicles:


- 2007 Pierce 85' aerial platform fire truck is our main fire attack vehicle. It is equipped with compressed air foam (CAFS) to extinguish fires in $\frac{1}{4}$ the time of water.
- 1997 Ford KME fire truck is used on all injury accidents and has a Phoenix jaws of life along with other rescue equipment.
- 1991 Ford Grumman 50' aerial ladder fire truck is used as an additional fire truck at fires and for mutual aid to surrounding cities.
- 2012 Chevrolet / Medtec paramedic ambulance is used for response to medical emergencies in the city.



The Public Safety Department has canes, walkers and wheelchairs on hand for residents to borrow when they find the need to use these items. The equipment can be obtained by contacting public safety dispatch



The department completed fire inspections on businesses and multi family dwellings. Businesses are checked for any fire hazards including emergency exit access, emergency lighting, updated fire extinguishers and storage of dangerous chemicals. All fire sprinkler systems or cooking grill hood systems are also inspected. The goals of the inspections are to protect employees, the community and firefighters. When problems are found, the businesses have a specified period of time to correct the violations. If they are not fixed, they are issued a violation and the business owner is required to go to court.





Monthly fire training throughout the year includes fire truck engineering, vehicle extrication from vehicles, RIT training, medical training and the use of all equipment in the fire division.

In 2004, the Public Safety Department Fire Division implemented a Rapid Intervention Team (R.I.T.). The team consists of one public safety sergeant and eight firefighters. The members are specially trained and equipped to rescue firefighters and civilians trapped in building fires. The team trains at least once a month over and above regular fire training.



On March 24th, 2015, the Fraser Department of Public Safety responded to a call of a kitchen fire at 18574 Masonic. The fire was located within a 16 unit apartment complex. Upon arrival, officers reported that the fire was observed through the roof. Due to the size of the fire, a second alarm was immediately called and assistance from surrounding departments responded. Once the building was confirmed evacuated, officers fought the fire from above using aerial suppression from our state of the art ladder truck. Ground crews were also utilized to battle the blaze from the ground. After the fire was extinguished, our department was pleased to report there were no injuries to any citizens or firefighters.

Marijuana Investigation

Working in conjunction with other city departments, it was learned that the occupant of a commercial building on Groesbeck was cultivating marijuana and had not obtained proper city authority to occupy the building. Detectives from the Special Investigations Unit set up surveillance of the building and observed an Arabic male exit the building with several garbage bags and place them into the trunk of a waiting vehicle. Officer approached and spoke with the man, who admitted that the garbage bags contained marijuana. The bags contained 86 gallon size bags of marijuana totaling just over 43 pounds in weight. The building contained 102 marijuana plants, many over 6' tall, and an additional 20 pounds of marijuana. Street value of the drug is in excess of \$120,000.




Criminal Enterprise



During the later part of 2014, Detectives from the Fraser Special Investigations Unit were able to infiltrate a criminal organization that was operating an illegal bookmaking operation. Search warrants were executed in January of 2015, which resulted in multiple arrests and the seizure of over \$58,000 in cash. The cash was concealed under a bed and inside of an Amazon box. In an effort to avoid detection by law enforcement, the organization used an online gaming website to manage its client wager activity, and like other websites seen by the unit, is based in Costa Rica.

Communications



Our communications Division serves many different functions. It's primary function is to answer all emergency and non emergency calls, dispatch the appropriate response and provide medical instructions to our residents if necessary.

The dispatchers are also responsible for monitoring all police and fire radios, greeting all citizens entering the lobby and monitoring all cameras for the interior and exterior of the building.

Each dispatcher is trained in Medical Priority Dispatching through the National Academy (NAOEMD). This training allows them to provide medical instructions, such as CPR, choking or breathing difficulty's over the phone to a caller until the medical personnel arrive. As with the public safety officers, the dispatchers update their training throughout the year.




Records




The Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) and Crime Prevention Unit provides our community with many educational programs. Officer Jack Simon works closely with our elementary schools teaching the DARE program. The 17 week program teaches sixth grade children about the dangers of drugs and how using drugs like tobacco, alcohol and marijuana can have a negative impact on their life and those around them. DARE also teaches kids about peer pressure, personal pressure, respect, self-confidence and the importance of being a leader. PSO Simon is dedicated to his Role as the DARE Officer. Officer Simon also visits both the middle and high schools, providing follow up lessons on the consequences of drug use and negative behavior.

Officer Simon works closely with the neighborhoods, seniors and other community members offering them information on crime prevention. PSO Simon has provided many programs for the community including senior safety seminars, babysitting classes, personal safety programs, crime prevention programs and much more.




