After years of staff reductions, we are finally witnessing a turnaround.

We continually work with our schools and educate our youth on the dangers of drugs and how addiction impacts everyone. Just recently, the new designer drug Cloud 9 that was being purchased at local gas stations and party stores was making several of our children ill throughout the county. Our agency spearheaded an informational meeting regarding this drug consisting of various members of local police agencies, the Macomb County Health Department, Poison Control, Michigan State Police Crime Lab, and the Macomb County Prosecutor's Office. Our meeting and proposed action plan made the national news. As a result, Macomb County Executive Mark Hackel signed an order to remove Cloud 9 off the shelves. Since this occurred, we have not witnessed any other child abusing this synthetic drug. We have also implemented a city ordinance that bans the sales of electronic cigarettes and hookah pens to individuals under the age of 18. We were the first city in the county to implement this ordinance.

A lot of time and effort is involved developing this report each year. I truly believe in transparency. We are a small agency however we offer many essential services compared to other departments. Our public safety department consists of a communications center, patrol division, fire division, criminal investigations division, narcotics unit, K-9, DARE and crime prevention, forensic unit, prisoner transportation, traffic, motor carrier enforcement, and paid on call firefighters. We continually make improvements each year so we can better serve your needs. Remember, we work for you.




Eleven specially trained officers are responsible for recovering and processing crime scene evidence. Some of the duties include:


- Identifying, collecting and preserving trace evidence




## Delivery of Cocaine

While on routine patrol, PSO Vandervord affected a traffic stop on a vehicle due to the driver texting while driving. Upon making contact with the driver, PSO Vandervord confirmed the driver was driving while license suspended. The driver was placed under arrest. During the investigation, PSO Vandervord smelled an odor of burnt marijuana omitting from within the vehicle. PSO Vandervord had K-9 Niko conduct a narcotic sniff of the vehicle. K-9 Niko showed an aggressive alert for narcotics on the stereo located in the dashboard. PSO Vandervord examined the stereo and discovered there was a secret compartment located behind the stereo in the dashboard. When the compartment was opened, PSO Vandervord located a clear plastic baggie containing small individually packaged baggies filled with crack cocaine. The packaging was consistent with the sales of narcotics. The driver was additionally charged with possession with intent to deliver crack cocaine.

PSO Jacques Simon and PSO Jason Poole of the Fraser Public Safety Dept have completed specialized training that will enhance the department's ability to detect and arrest drivers under the influence of drugs.

DREs are trained to recognize signs of impairment in drivers under the influence of drugs other than, or in addition to, alcohol and to identify the category or categories of drugs causing the impairment. DREs conduct a 12-step evaluation process to make this determination.

PSO's Simon and Poole took part in two weeks of instruction at the Michigan State Police Training Academy in Lansing and spent a third week conducting drug assessments at the Maricopa County Jail in Arizona. This facility processes an average of 900 inmates per day which provided officers the opportunity to conduct hands-on drug evaluations for all seven drug categories, a requirement of the course.

The DRE program, also referred to as the Drug Evaluation Classification Program, began in the 1970s with the Los Angeles Police Department. The program operates under the guidelines and direction of the International Association of Chiefs of Police and is supported by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). There are more than 7,300 DREs across the nation. Nationally, 18% of all drivers killed in crashes in 2009 tested positive for drugs, according to NHTSA. In Michigan, 20% of drivers killed tested positive for drugs.



According to recent statistics, alcohol use has declined dramatically while drug use has risen. Only 1.5% of weekend nighttime drivers had BACs at or above .08. However, 22.5% tested positive for drugs, an increase from 16.3% in 2007. 12.6% tested positive for marijuana, compared to 8.6% in 2007. PSO Simon recently received his certification as a DRE instructor and will assist the Michigan Office of Highway Safety and Planning in teaching the DRE curriculum to officers across the state and helping them obtain their DRE certification.

## Cyber Crime Investigation & Digital Forensics Unit

To date, the Cybercrime and Digital Forensic Unit has been involved in multiple investigations of cybercrime, specifically cyberstalking, fraud, and various other computer related offenses. Computer Forensic examinations have also been carried out to assist in narcotic, gambling, and death investigations.

The unit has worked to assist area departments with computer forensic examinations. The unit has also expanded its forensic capabilities now having the ability to perform forensic examinations on cellular phones and similar personal data accessories. PSO Eric Myers has also obtained certification as an AccessData Certified Examiner (A.C.E.)



The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) consists of one lieutenant, one sergeant, two detectives, one prisoner / property officer and one secretary.

Detectives in CID further investigate reports from the forwarded from the road patrol division. They conduct follow up investigations including interviews of victims, witnesses and suspects. Once their investigations are complete, warrant requests are completed and forwarded to the prosecutor's office or city attorney. Detectives are then in charge of cases to their conclusion in the court system

One of the detectives investigates crimes involving juvenile suspects. This detective also works as a liaison with Fraser Public Schools to handle all criminal complaints in the schools.

Liquor license background investigations are completed in this division when businesses are requesting licensing through the Michigan Liquor Control Commission. Annual sting operations are conducted at all businesses in the city with liquor licenses to assure compliance to all laws.

CID completes all backgrounds on applicants for pawn shops, second hand, and precious metal businesses. Detectives also handle all enforcement of these stores. The department continues to use "Leads on Line" which is a computerized system to track all business transactions for pawn shops, second hand stores and precious metal businesses.

## Cyber Crimes

In 2014, Detective Lisa Pettyes investigated an alarming increase of “Cyber” complaints over the internet and through social media accounts. These accounts include: TWITTER, KIK, INSTAGRAM, and SNAP CHAT.

Many complaints have been investigated concerning middle school and high school students sending nude photos of themselves to people they are communicating with. They post these photos onto social media accounts. This is a crime. This is considered “child pornography”.

Another increased issue is “Cyber Bullying”. Students harass each other through text or by posting hurtful things onto social media. A common trend is students creating fake social media accounts. Accounts can be created under a victim’s name and misrepresent the victim. This can be done by fabricating lies about the victim or harassing other students through the fake account.


Parents need to be aware of all of their child’s social media accounts and monitor these accounts frequently. Out of a poll of 100 students, less than ten indicated that their parents have total access to their accounts. All of the students advised that when they become parents, they will insist on monitoring their own children’s accounts. The Public Safety Department is working diligently to end these crimes and educate students on these crimes.

## Indecent Exposure

In May of 2014, Public Safety Officers were dispatched to Walgreens for an Indecent Exposure. While an employee was working in an aisle a male confronted the employee pulling down his pants and exposing himself. The suspect fled the scene. After a lengthy investigation by Detective Sergeant Jerry Gorney, a suspect was developed and a photo line-up was done. The suspect was arrested and convicted in court.

## Theft from a Motor Vehicle

In March of 2014, a brand new Chevrolet pickup truck was stolen in Fraser. It was later recovered with the GPS / Radio System missing. An investigation into the theft developed a suspect after the item was listed on Craigslist. Detective Mike lafrate made arrangements to buy the part from the suspect at 13 Mile and Groesbeck. The part was recovered and had the same vehicle identification number as the stolen truck. The suspect was arrested and charged with theft from a motor vehicle. He was sentenced to 4 years in prison. He was a suspect in numerous thefts from vehicles in Fraser, Roseville and Eastpointe.




The Fraser Department of Public Safety Fire Division is responsible for providing fire protection and advanced life support services to the City of Fraser.

One sergeant is assigned to the fire division to complete fire inspections of all businesses in the city. He also conducts fire training for all fire personnel twice a month. Three department personnel have been trained to investigate cause and origin at serious fires. Four Firefighter / Paramedics are assigned to three platoons to provide advanced life support and fire response.

Personnel assigned to the division are also responsible for ordering fire and medical supplies, conducting daily vehicle checks and managing all equipment on the trucks and in the fire garage.


The city has five 302 sites in the city which the state deems as high hazard businesses. Special safety measures are in place at the businesses and the Public Safety Department has special written procedures on how to respond to emergencies at these businesses. All members get extra annual training at these businesses.



The department operates 4 fire emergency vehicles:

- 2007 Pierce 85' aerial platform fire truck is our main fire attack vehicle. It is equipped with compressed air foam (CAFS) to extinguish fires in ¼ the time of water.
- 1997 Ford KME fire truck is used on all injury accidents and has a Phoenix jaws of life along with other rescue equipment.
- 1991 Ford Grumman 50' aerial ladder fire truck is used as an additional fire truck at fires and for mutual aid to surrounding cities.
- 2012 Chevrolet / Medtec paramedic ambulance is used for response to medical emergencies in the city.


### 2014 Ambulance Responses



The Public Safety Department has canes, walkers and wheelchairs on hand for residents to borrow when they find the need to use these items. The equipment can be obtained by contacting public safety dispatch

The department completed fire inspections on businesses and multi family dwellings. Businesses are checked for any fire hazards including emergency exit access, emergency lighting, updated fire extinguishers and storage of dangerous chemicals. All fire sprinkler systems or cooking grill hood systems are also inspected. The goals of the inspections are to protect employees, the community and firefighters. When problems are found, the businesses have a specified period of time to correct the violations.. If they are not fixed, they are issued a violation and the business owner is required to go to court.

### 2014 Fire Runs





Monthly fire training throughout the year includes fire truck engineering, vehicle extrication from vehicles, RIT training, medical training and the use of all equipment in the fire division.

In 2004, the Public Safety Department Fire Division implemented a Rapid Intervention Team (R.I.T.). The team consists of one public safety sergeant and eight firefighters. The members are specially trained and equipped to rescue firefighters and civilians trapped in building fires. The team trains at least once a month over and above regular fire training.



In January of 2014, the public safety department responded to a vehicle fire that was situated between two homes. A fully engulfed vehicle was parked in a residential driveway. The firefighters were able to extinguish the fire and protect both residences from extensive damage. The vehicle was a total loss.

The cause of the fire was from a light bulb that ignited a plastic tarp that initiated the vehicle compartment on fire. The homeowner was using the light bulb for a heating device to warm the windshield washer reservoir line because of the freezing conditions.

In October of 2014, the Public Safety Department responded to a basement fire. There was heavy fire and smoke damage to the basement but there was no fire damage done to the first or second floors. The cause of the fire was determined to be overheating commercial batteries stored in the basement.

In June of 2014, the Public Safety Department responded to a commercial building fire at a closed business. The fire was found to be in a snowmobile that was being stored at the business causing heavy black smoke throughout the building. The fire was extinguished quickly and there was no fire damage to the structure.

In August of 2014, the Public Safety Department responded to the report of electrical wires down on a detached garage. Smoke and flame were coming from under a closed garage door. A window had to be breached and the firefighters were able to extinguish the fire. The garage and a new vehicle inside were a total loss.

## Cocaine Investigation

In August of 2014, the Fraser Special Investigations Unit conducted a search warrant execution at a residence on Lexington Street in Eastpointe. The search warrant was granted after several controlled purchases were made from the suspect, who was residing at the Lexington address. With the assistance of St. Clair Shores Detectives, the suspect was taken into custody and inside the property was over 250 grams of crack cocaine, packaging, a scale, over \$3,000 in cash, and 2 loaded handguns. The suspect, a four time convicted felon, is currently awaiting trial in Macomb County Jail.



## Criminal Enterprise




In January of 2014, the Fraser Special Investigations Unit concluded a 2 year investigation into a criminal enterprise that was operating from Dearborn, MI. Undercover Detectives were able to infiltrate the organization and gain the trust of the main operator. After gaining his trust, bets were made and assets used to launder the illegal proceeds of the operation were identified. The investigation culminated with the execution of 3 search warrants on two commercial properties and one residential. The Michigan Attorney General's Office handled the prosecution and asset forfeiture, which included over 10 properties, a liquor license, numerous banks accounts, and over \$50,000 in cash.

## Criminal Enterprise



Early on in 2014, the Fraser Special Investigation Unit received a Crime Stoppers tip of a local resident that was using social media to sell narcotics and prescription medications. While unable to find the resident specifically named in the tip, it was made apparent by the other posts on these sites that narcotics trafficking was flourishing openly. Throughout the year, Undercover Detectives would periodically check the social sites and make purchases of illegal narcotics and controlled prescription medication that was being offered for sale. For the year, fifteen arrests were made using the sites, fourteen of which were delivery of narcotics related and one for solicitation of prostitution.

Communications



Our communications Division serves many different functions. It's primary function is to answer all emergency and non emergency calls, dispatch the appropriate response and provide medical instructions to our residents if necessary.

The dispatchers are also task with monitoring all police and fire radios, greeting all citizens entering the lobby and monitoring all cameras for the interior and exterior of the building.

Each dispatcher is trained in Medical Priority Dispatching through the National Academy (NAOEMD). This training allows them to provide medical instructions, such as CPR, choking or breathing difficulty's over the phone to a caller until the medical personnel arrive. As with the public safety officers, the dispatchers update their training throughout the year




Records





**PSO Jack Simon**




The Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) and Crime Prevention Unit provides our community with many educational programs. 


